Enrollment

The enrollment this year is similar to last year, with a few shifts. The informal enrollment number from August 6th was 1692. We will most likely remain steady for the official enrollment day on September 30th. Our free and reduced lunch rates are up to over 54% district-wide. The breakdown by school is below:

Summer Library Program

Our Summer Library program was successful again this year. A total of 909 people visited during the four time slots (Capron, NBUE, PG-morning, and PG-evening). One hundred and thirty-four different students from all six schools checked out/renewed a total of 1,756 items. The 2013 Summer Library sessions were funded through Title I, Target, and Woodman's. It is a great way to help ensure that our students keep reading over the summer.

Homecoming Week

This is homecoming week and the NBHS students and staff would love to see you at the homecoming parade and bonfire on Thursday, the football game on Friday and the dance on Saturday.

Drug Awareness

We had the Boone County Sheriff come to the NBMS staff meeting to discuss some of the new names and types of drugs that are appearing and how to recognize the signs of drug use in our students.

Capital Development Board

We were notified Thursday afternoon that the Capital Development Board will be funding our 2003 building programs up to a cost of \$13,545,489. The CDB has requested a great deal of information about the land sales previous to the CDB Grant application. We are currently working to gather these documents.

Rhonda and I met with the Baird finance people last week to review a couple of the potential ways to address the CDB funding and potentially how to restructure some of our debt. We had a number of questions in which Baird will need to review with Chapman and Cutler. Upon the review, we will bring forward a couple of options.

Manchester Septic Line

As mentioned previously, the septic line at Manchester has some issues. Mr. Novak was informed that the line is crushed beneath the gymnasium. He is currently working on getting estimates to repair. Similarly, Mr. Novak is working to obtain estimates for safety upgrades to the current bleachers.

RVC President Search

I feel the next RVC president will be an important piece to building a vocational educational program for the area, and will actually be able to serve the needs of our students. I believe the RVC faculty is not particularly supportive of the concept of being involved with high school vocational education therefore, the new president will need to have a strong vision and leadership skills to enable RVC to become a real partner in this process.

WAN and Internet Bandwidth

According to the chart below, the students are accessing the new bandwidth. The chart shows peak demands of nearly half the current bandwidth. The first real test of the new infrastructure will be during the first iteration of MAP testing later this month. Last year we were limited to 30MB of throughput. For instance, students at the high school working on video development were able to download videos, and all work simultaneously. In previous years, in order to not time each other out, students had to be alternate usage.
