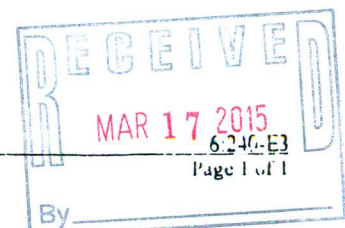

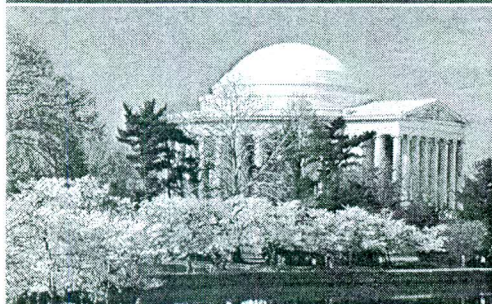

DAY 1

ARRIVAL

Meet your WorldStrides Course Leader and prepare for an action-packed adventure in our nation's capital. As you feel the excitement of the city, envision the influential men and women who have walked these very streets and the powerful decisions they've made that have shaped the history of our country.

ARLINGTON NATIONAL CEMETERY

With over 600 acres dedicated to the hundreds of thousands who sacrificed their lives for our country, it is hard not to feel the utmost admiration and respect for these brave men and women when visiting the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. This structure, built to honor unknown soldiers from wars past, is guarded at all times by Army Infantry Soldiers of the Old Guard or 3rd Infantry Regiment, who facilitate special wreath-laying ceremonies on a daily basis. Consider the true meaning of sacrifice as members of an on-looking crowd place their hands over their hearts and fall silent while a bugler plays *Taps* to honor the fallen soldiers.

IWO JIMA MEMORIAL

A news photographer captured a moment on film which later inspired this memorial dedicated to the Marines who gave their lives for our country. Reading from the massive base of these 32-foot-high figures, be sure to ponder the famous inscription, "Uncommon valor was a common virtue."

PENTAGON MEMORIAL

Many remember exactly what they were doing on that fateful day in September of 2001. The Pentagon Memorial immortalizes an event that had a tremendous impact on many lives. Walking among the 184 benches meant to symbolize each victim ensures you will never forget those who lost their lives at the Pentagon.

ALEXANDRIA

You can walk the beautiful streets of Old Town Alexandria knowing that many of our founding fathers and historical icons have walked

the same streets. Take an eerie ghost tour to learn of some of the town's oldest ghost tales, dating back to colonial times.

MOUNT VERNON

Perhaps no other man did more to shape our country's principles and beliefs than George Washington. He could have chosen to lead our country as a dictator but instead saw the value in true democracy, checks and balances, and government by and for the people. JEFFERSON MEMORIAL

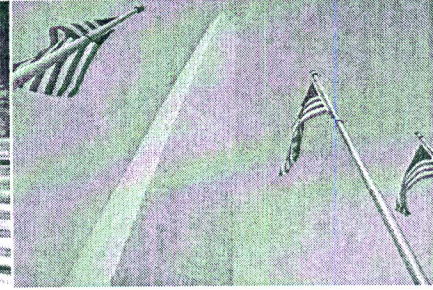
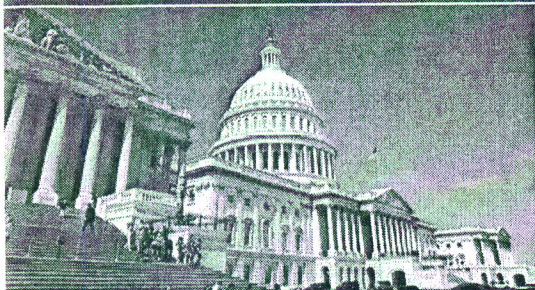

FDR MEMORIAL

This memorial honors a great president who helped Americans overcome the toughest financial period in history, the Great Depression. Gain a deeper appreciation for the way Franklin D. Roosevelt reached out to the American people on a personal level through his fireside chats. The words of FDR line the walls of the four rooms of this memorial and help you imagine the comfort they brought to Americans during extremely difficult times.

MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. NATIONAL MEMORIAL

Commemorate King's work by reading some of his most famous sayings on the 450-foot Inscription Wall. Feel the power of his words while standing in the shadow of the Stone of Hope, which includes a larger-than-life carving of Dr. King.

FORD'S THEATRE AND THE PETERSEN HOUSE (Appointment Required)

You probably know Abraham Lincoln was assassinated while attending this famous theatre on April 14, 1865, but you may not be familiar with the controversy behind the murder of this great president. Follow this mystery in the newly built museum, and visit the room in the Petersen House where Lincoln passed away the morning after he was shot.

WHITE HOUSE (Picture Stop)

This six-level, 132-room mansion seems modest compared to some of the other historical buildings in Washington, D.C., but its presence is far from small. The White House is a long-standing symbol of the presidency, our government, and the American people. Be sure to look for a strategically placed Marine outside the West Wing; it means someone very important is inside!

NATIONAL ARCHIVES

Walk through the home of some of our nation's most important documents. Read the preamble to the Constitution in its original ink. Think of how writings like the Bill of Rights and the Declaration of Independence impact our lives still today and ensure our basic freedoms as Americans.

LUNCH

CAPITOL HILL (Tour by Appointment)

As you explore this group of powerful structures, imagine the important decisions that are made here every day. Walk the underground tunnels where lawmakers and representatives of Congress meet. Take in the miles of books and other important documents in the Library of Congress. Take a seat on the steps of the highest court in the land, the U.S. Supreme Court.

DINNER

LINCOLN MEMORIAL

As one of the most recognizable memorials, the Lincoln Memorial is a student favorite. Contemplate this president's achievements

from a unique vantage point, at the foot of the massive 19-foot-tall seated statue of Abraham Lincoln. Stand in the spot where Martin Luther King, Jr., stood and imagine what it was like for him to deliver his famous "I Have a Dream" speech in 1963.

KOREAN WAR VETERANS MEMORIAL

The expressive eyes of the 19 statues of the Korean War Veterans Memorial will stay etched in your memory. These figures are heavily detailed with ponchos, boots, and helmets to portray actual soldier garb worn during the Korean War.

VIETNAM VETERANS MEMORIAL

Looking at the Vietnam Memorial, it's hard to fathom the personal significance of the rows and rows of names. However, when you see flowers and poems left by loved ones, and children searching for a relative's name, you realize each name on that wall represents someone's son, daughter, mother, father, brother, or sister.

WASHINGTON MONUMENT (Picture Stop)

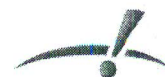

WORLD WAR II MEMORIAL

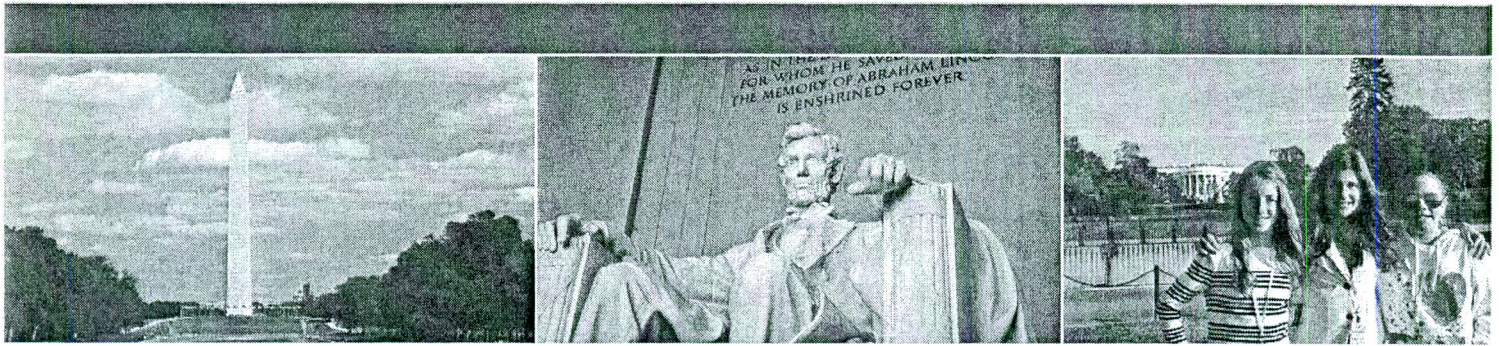
